# MAGIS CORE CURRICULUM

(Class of 2023 and later)

Humanistic education rooted in Jesuit ethos, guides Fairfield's commitment to "preparing young women and men for others" through a distinctive academic experience. Crucial to student success in academia and as future professionals in the workplace, the Magis Core Curriculum engages students to establish their own values and understanding of the world while emphasizing excellence in writing, critical reasoning, synthesis of solutions, communication, and an understanding of the "why" and "how" of associated human behaviors.

The Magis Core Curriculum is a discipline-based, tiered learning experience. Further, it requires students to engage in interdisciplinary learning, be exposed to social justice issues, and undertake intensive writing both within the discipline and across the curriculum. The Magis Core provides a common experience for *all* undergraduates, one that is grounded in the humanistic tradition and is thus a hallmark of a Fairfield education.

# **ONLINE REGISTRATION SCHEDULE**

# **UNDERGRADUATE REGISTRATION PROCESS**

- Students with a financial or Dean of Students hold will not be able to register.
- Students must meet with their faculty advisor prior to registration to discuss course selection and to receive their PIN. A student's faculty advisor is listed on their degree evaluation.
- Undergraduate students should register for all courses on their class registration day and are limited to a maximum of 17-19 credits, depending on program.
- If a student chooses to drop a class and later changes their mind, or if they are removed for non-payment, they will *not* be guaranteed a place in the same class.

# **COMMUNITY-ENGAGED LEARNING**

Community-Engaged Learning is an experiential approach to teaching and learning that links academic study and community-engaged work so that each is strengthened—and both are transformed.

Characteristics of Community-Engaged Learning courses:

- Rigorous academic learning
- Meaningful and appropriate community-engaged project work that meets community-identified needs
- Guided critical reflection
- Reciprocal and mutually beneficial partnerships and collaborations

Students may search by the following attributes using the Advanced Search function in the Banner 9 Registration System.

**Community-Engaged Learning (SERL)** = all students in the course are required to participate in communityengaged work

**Community-Engaged Learning Option (SERO)** = students have a choice to participate in community-engaged learning as a final project and/or in lieu of a comparable project.

# **Course Schedules**

The live schedule of all courses is available online at <u>fairfield.edu/registration</u> > Browse Classes. The online registration portal contains the most up-to-date information regarding course meeting times, instructors, and enrollment status.

Advanced Search options are available, such as browsing by subject, department, college/school, or attribute. Attribute search is useful for finding courses that fit various criteria, such as Magis Signature Element requirements, interdisciplinary minors, residential colleges, and service learning.

# Degree Evaluation on the Web: Degree Works

All matriculated undergraduate students have a degree evaluation online showing the requirements of their program, including core, majors, and minors. To run a degree evaluation from **my.fairfield.edu**, search and click on the Degree Evaluation task. *Students should print a degree evaluation and bring it with them when they meet with their advisor, or be ready to display it on their personal laptop or tablet device.* 

**Please note**: Degree Works only shows course-level attributes in course detail links. Students should use the Web Registration portal to browse attributes that may be instructor- or semester-specific, such as Magis Core Signature Elements, Diversity Requirements, Residential College, and Community-Engaged Learning courses.

# **Directions for Banner 9 Online Registration System**

The student registration system is accessed in the university portal, <u>my.Fairfield.edu</u>. by authentication with a **Fairfield University Net ID and password**. Every student has an account on this system. If a student needs assistance with their NetID or password, they should contact the ITS Help Desk at 203-254-4069 or submit a ticket via <u>my.Fairfield.edu</u>.

After logging in to <u>my.Fairfield.edu</u>, click on the **Course Registration** task:

**Prior** to registration, students will be prompted to complete **Action Items** as requirements from the Office of the Bursar. Action Items consist of students electronically signing/accepting the Student Promissory Agreement and selecting a payment method[s] for tuition and other applicable charges for registration semester(s). A complete review of the Action Item process/instructions can be found <u>HERE</u>. These requirements can be completed well in advance of registration to make registration a quick and easy process. If a student does not have a computer with Internet capabilities, they can use one in the library or DSBN 217. They should not call the ITS Help Desk for non-technical issues.

## Special Course Registration: Independent Study, Internship, Capstone, Research Seminar, etc.

#### Internships

Internships provide the opportunity for practical experience in a career field related to a student's major. Most departments and programs offer credit for internships in appropriate agencies and business firms in Fairfield, nearby communities, as well as New York City and New Haven. Majors who wish to take advantage of these opportunities should consult their department chair or program internship coordinator about eligibility requirements and other details.

#### **Online Courses**

All full-time students are eligible to enroll in *one* online course per semester without needing prior Dean's Office approval. First-year students may not enroll in online courses during their first semester.

- Part-time students are not restricted to one online course. Exceptions to the one-course limit for full-time students may be made only in extenuating circumstances and must by vetted through the academic dean.
- Students should be aware that many online courses are condensed (typically only seven weeks in duration) and therefore rigorous. Online courses often have irregular start and end dates (sometimes beginning at the halfway point of the semester). As with semester-long lecture-based courses, class enrollment is firmly capped, and availability may be limited.

# Waitlist Courses

Waitlist processing, including notification and registration, begins when registration opens. Waitlists end two weeks prior to the start of each term.

- When a space becomes available in a class, the first student on the waitlist will be notified via their University Gmail account with instructions on how to register for the waitlisted class. **Students will have 24 hours from the time the email is sent to register for the class.** If there is a conflict in their schedule, the student will have to resolve that issue before registering for the waitlisted class. If the student fails to register for the class by the deadline stated in the email, they will be removed from the waitlist for that class.
- Waitlists and the process of notifying students will run through Tuesday, August 20, 2024. During this period, the Registrar's Office will not honor permissions from instructors for closed courses. The electronic waitlist will be the only mechanism for filling available openings in closed courses. After August 20th, students may register for classes with open seats on a first come, first served basis. During the Add/Drop period of September 3rd-9th, 2024, the Registrar will accept permissions from instructors for closed courses with the approval of the appropriate department chair and/or assistant dean. These requests must be sent to registrar@fairfield.edu and include the CRN, course subject/number, student Fairfield ID number.
